on the Denali Natural History Tour and stare in awe at Denali – the highest peak in North America, rising 20,310 feet.

Witness the Chena River by boat, stop by Talkeetna – considered one of Alaska's "funkiest" small towns – to visit a main street inundated with roadhouse restaurants, cafes, brew pubs and shops.

Visit the acclaimed Anchorage Museum before taking a brief tour of Alaska's largest city. See the Chugach Mountains. Discover Seward – one of the state's oldest communities – or hike a trail that approaches a glacier. You can hear the ice crackling.

These places barely scratch the surface of Alaska's dense personality. It's one so deep, it cuts into the core of the earth.

Alyeska offers a rich variety of marine species. Stroll through the forest and along mountain trails abloom with wildflowers in Girdwood and enjoy water views of the Turnagain Arm and Cook Inlet. Dig deeper into the 49th state's history and heritage in Fairbanks.

Alaska's story is a chapter-filled masterpiece. Each one enlightens your curiosities and leaves you yearning to absorb its mystical traits.

That's why cruising it by sea is considered just as satisfying as trekking it by land. Seven nights on *Radiance of the Seas* will enhance Alaska's mysteries from different perspectives.

Your cruise embarks from Vancouver or Seward, depending on your itinerary. *Radiance of the Seas* is a floating resort that boasts myriad activities. Sail to Alaskan destinations that will enhance your trip. See cities and small towns, glaciers and waterways, including Inside Passage. It stretches more than 500 miles from the Puget Sound into the Gulf of Alaska. Shaped by glaciers, the landscapes are comprised of mountains, crisp blue icebergs, deep fjords and more than 1,000 islands.

Few cruise ships visit Sitka, but it's a stop well worth taking. The picturesque town has a rich-Russian heritage and a host of historical attractions.

Ketchikan is labeled the "Salmon Capital of the World". Culture-hungry

cruisers can witness the largest collection of standing totem poles globally. See humpback whales off the coast during the summer.

Mountains coated with vibrant green landscapes surround Juneau. It's home to the Alaska State Museum. Hike up Mount Roberts for panoramic views across the city or hop on the Mount Roberts Tramway and ride to its apex.

Witness Hubbard Glacier – the largest tidewater glacier in North America. It calves throughout the summer and towers over passing cruise ships.

Miners once flocked to Skagway. Its historic district houses 100 buildings from the gold-rush era, making it a fascinating stop.

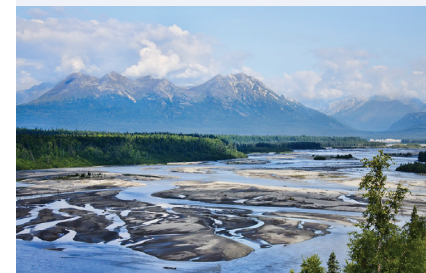

just outside the small village of Hoonah on Chichagof Island – home to the largest bear population in the world. Watch for whales and other wildlife. Take a vehicle expedition, brave the world's largest ziprider or just absorb the surroundings.

Haines, meanwhile, is simply breathtaking. The sun peeks above beautiful mountains that rest above thick forests. Kayak in its calm lakes, spot the American Bald Eagle, as well as other species, fish or visit its art galleries.

AAA to provide roadside services through Apple Members can receive assistance via satellite on iPhone 15, 14

Users of the newly announced Apple iPhone 15 and iPhone 14 now can get access to Roadside Assistance via satellite by utilizing AAA services.

AAA is one of North America's largest and most-trusted membership organizations. It responds to more than 30 million calls for roadside assistance annually and serves more than 63 million members. By working with Apple, AAA will be able to reach people who may otherwise be unable to receive help.

"Safety is at the core of who AAA is as an organization, and we're taking that commitment to the next level by offering AAA services to iPhone users who would have previously been unreachable," said Marshall Doney, president and CEO, AAA. "Now, thanks to iPhone's satellite capabilities, iPhone users with Roadside Assistance via satellite can get help when they need it most but can't reach us via traditional connections."

iPhone users who request roadside assistance can be connected via satellite with AAA after answering a few questions to capture important details. Users will receive clear guidance on how to stay connected to a satellite. It will allow them to message with a AAA agent and receive important information about the status of their request.

"We know firsthand how stressful it is to be stranded with a breakdown, especially if you find yourself in a remote location or without cell service," said Doney. "Your options are limited – walk to a service point or area with cellular connectivity or Wi-Fi, which can be

miles away, or attempt to flag another motorist down. Apple's satellite infrastructure is an innovative solution that is already providing critical emergency support to iPhone users, and AAA is proud to offer Roadside Assistance via satellite in partnership with Apple."

Roadside Assistance via satellite will be available on all iPhone 15 and iPhone 14 users in the U.S., regardless of whether they are a AAA Member. Once the questionnaire is received, AAA Members will be verified and service will be provided. Nonmembers will be responsible for payment upon completion of the service.

Roadside Assistance via satellite is built on the groundbreaking technology that powers Emergency SOS by satellite, launched by Apple in 2022. It allows iPhone 14 and iPhone 15 users to access emergency services via satellite when cellular coverage or Wi-Fi is unavailable.
